ABSTRACT

The focus of this research was to investigate the effectiveness of using series of pictures in teaching writing narrative text for the second grade of senior high school students. It was also to find out the advantages and the disadvantages of using this kind of media.

Pretest-postest design which is the subset of quasi experimental design was used to conduct the research. The samples of this study were two group served as an experimental group and control group. The experimental group was given several treatments in the period of five meetings, while the control group was not given any treatment.

Data collection was conducted by doing test namely pretest and postest, interview, and questionnaire. Pretest was given to the two group at the beginning of the reserach, while posttest was given at the end of the reserach. Thus, the t-test procedures were used in the data analysis. Furthermore, the data from questionnaire and interview which was administered to the experimental group were analyzed to examine the advantages and the disadavantages of using series of pictures.

The research findings showed that there were significant difference between the pretest and the posttest result of two groups. In addition, the data result from questionnaire and interview showed that series of pictures have advantages and disadvantages both for students in their learning and for teacher in her teaching. In conclusion, series of pictures is effective used to teach writing narrative text. The writer recommends series of pictures applied in different kinds of text to teach other skills, such as speaking, listening, and reading.
