

CHAPTER III

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

This chapter presents the research methodology, which includes an explanation of the research questions, method of the research, data source, data collection, data analysis, and data presentation.

3.1. Research Questions

This section is conducted to answer the two research questions that have been mentioned on the previous chapter, which are how good women are labeled, and what destinies for good women that are built, inside the Grimm's Fairy Tales.

3.2. The Research Subject and Context

The subjects of the research are three chosen stories from *Grimm's Fairy Tales* written by Jacob Grimm and Wilhelm Grimm. The book was published by Project Gutenberg E-Book in 2008 and translated by Edgar Taylor and Marian Edwardes. The book is written in English and it consists of 62 fairy stories and 267 pages. *Snow-White*, *Briar-Rose*, and *The Goose Girl* are used in this research because they describe the way good women are labeled and the destinies that are built, inside the Grimm's Fairy Tales.

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3.3. Research Methodology

The research employs a qualitative descriptive to answer the research questions. It is used to describe the data from the text which is *Grimm's Fairy Tales* written by Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm. Fraenkel and Wallen (1993) stated that descriptive research covers any kind of written or visual content of a document, essay, textbook, literary work, news media, recipe political speeches, advertisement even pictures.

The three chosen stories (*Snow-White*, *Briar Rose* and *The Goose-Girl*) in *Grimm's Fairy Tales* are read. Notes are taken from every single datum or information relevant to answer the research questions. To answer the research questions, the research focuses on the story and the main character of the stories by analyzing the words, phrases, and sentences that are related to how good women are labeled and what destinies for good women that are built inside the three Grimm's fairy tales (*Snow-White*, *Briar Rose*, and *The Goose Girl*).

3.4. Data Collection

The data are collected from the textual evidence in the book *Grimm's Fairy Tales* in the form of words, utterances, expressions, thoughts that were purposively selected and directed to answer the research questions.

3.5. Data Analysis

In analyzing the data, several steps have been taken. First, reading the three chosen stories in *Grimm's Fairy Tales* (*Snow-White*, *Briar Rose*, and *The Goose Girl*) repeatedly. Second, collecting some textual evidences which are related to the research questions. Third, picking up the evidences that can lead to answer how good women are labeled and what destinies that are built, inside the Grimm's Fairy Tales as evidenced in the text. Afterward, the theory of gender-role perspective by Lieberman (1986) is utilized as a tool to find the answers. After those steps are completed, the next step is presenting the data analysis in the form of narration. Finally, the last step is drawing conclusion and suggestions based on the findings of the research.

3.6. Data Presentation

The analyzed data are then presented in tables such as the following:
